Description of Training: ‘Cognition Rehabilitation’ includes therapeutic services to improve cognitive functioning and participation in activities that may be affected by difficulties in one or more cognitive domains following an acquired brain injury. This presentation will focus on evidence-supported cognitive rehabilitation approaches, with an emphasis on attention, memory, executive functions, and language.

Learning Objectives: Upon completion of this training, program participants will be able to:

1. Explain recommended rehabilitation approaches, strategies, and techniques to treat attention, memory, executive functions, and language deficits following ABI.
2. Describe how use of attention, memory, executive function, and language strategies and techniques may improve activity participation post-ABI.
3. Revise use of approaches, strategies, and techniques to treat attention, memory, executive functions, and language deficits based on ABI severity (mild, moderate, severe)
4. State why cognitive rehabilitation may facilitate increased neuroplasticity post-ABI.



Faculty Bio: Dr. O’Neil-Pirozzi is an Associate Professor in the Northeastern University Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders. She is also research faculty in the Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital/ Harvard Medical School Traumatic Brain Injury Model System. Dr. O’Neil-Pirozzi has worked with individuals with neurological disorders for more than 20 years. She is the author/co-author of numerous peer-reviewed publications, regarding the assessment and treatment of cognitive-communication impairments following acquired brain injury, with an emphasis on brain health, cognitive exercise, and neuroplasticity; return to work; and cross-cultural caregiver and survivor responses to acquired brain injury. Dr. O’Neil-Pirozzi is a long-time collaborator/partner of the Brain Injury Association of Massachusetts.
